Some of our City's greatest events take place in the spring and early summer, including Art on the Square, Old Town Market, Outdoor Summer Concerts, Memorial Day and Shrine Circus Parades, and Wine, Dine & Jazz. I hope you will plan to enjoy these events with your family and friends.

We apologize that this edition of the newsletter is arriving a little later than normal. We purposely held up its publication so we could include the results of the April 7 election. An up-to-date list of your Elected Officials can be found on page 6 of this newsletter.

If you are not sure which ward you live in, visit our City website at www.belleville.net. From the left side of the home page, select the Belleville Area Maps link. Scroll down to the Ward Map and enter your address in the search bar at the top of the map. Your address will be identified inside your ward boundaries with a red marker. Use the color coded legend at the bottom of the map to see which ward you live in.

I am extremely pleased to let you know that on January 1st of this year, The National Shrine of Our Lady of the Snows was officially annexed into the City of Belleville. Despite the Belleville address it has always had, it was not included inside the corporate City limits of Belleville until a few months ago. This Shrine is one of the largest outdoor shrines in North America.

In addition to the annexation news, The Shrine has announced news of the development of the property owned

by the Missionary Oblates of Mary Immaculate across from The National Shrine on the north side of Rt. 15. This new development will include hotels, a convention center, convenience store and gas station, a German Hofbrauhaus, and four other restaurants; all very welcomed and much needed additions to our city. Our Police Department will begin its renovation at its new location at 720 W. Main St. within the next few weeks. Plans are to have the department fully relocated by May of 2016.

The current Police Department building will be demolished so the back of City Hall can be reconstructed to make it ADA compliant. The renovations will include the addition of a ramp for handicap accessibility into the building, and a handicap accessible restroom, drinking fountain and elevator. The renovations will also allow for the expansion of the City Council Chambers and additional parking for those doing business or attending meetings at City Hall.

There are many Road Construction Projects planned for this year. We apologize in advance for the road closures that these projects will require, but we are hopeful that the results of the project outcomes will minimize the temporary inconvenience of the road closures. I consider it a privilege and an honor to serve as the Mayor of this great City. Thank you for the support you provide to our local businesses, churches, schools, organizations, and events. It is that support and commitment that makes us a strong Community of Character.

CITY'S WASTEWATER DIVISION WINS TOP HONORS AWARD

On Friday, February 6, Mayor Mark W. Eckert and Royce Carlisle, Director of the City's Wastewater Division, joined representatives from TWM, Inc., to receive the top Waste & Storm Water Engineering Excellence award in the state for the recent expansion of Belleville's Water Reclamation Facility. The award recognizes exceptional engineering projects that meet the needs of the client and benefit the public welfare.

Belleville collaborated with TWM to develop a Long-Term Control Plan for Combined Sewer Overflows (CSO), as required by the Illinois and U.S. EPA. The first, and largest, phase of this plan included an expansion of and modifications to the existing Water Reclamation Facility. The primary purpose was to improve water quality by addressing and reducing CSO issues. Throughout the project, TWM used green technologies for energy efficiency and to reduce the environmental impact of outflow to the greatest extent possible.

Cost-saving measures were also implemented to minimize the user charge increase such as converting existing sludge lagoons to CSO management basins, instead of resorting to all new construction,



thus reducing the overall impact on sewer rates.

The final design increases treatment capacity by more than 50% from 8.0 to 12.4 million gallons per day to support growth and development in Belleville.

The project will receive a National Recognition Award at the ACEC Engineering Excellence Awards Gala in Washington, DC in April, and will have the opportunity to compete for a top award on the national level.



CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS FOR 2015

The construction season is just around the corner which means you will see road closures throughout Belleville while improvements are made to the City's infrastructure. The City's Engineering Department is planning to accomplish over \$8 million in roadway and infrastructure improvements over this next construction season. For the safety of the workers and city staff that will be working on these projects, please use caution when going through these construction zones. Below is a list of projects to be completed during this construction season. These projects should be completed during this construction season with the exception of the North Illinois Streetscape which will be completed over two construction seasons.

In addition to roadway projects, the City has an aggressive maintenance plan. This plan includes 50/50 sidewalk replacement, concrete street patching, asphalt street patching, drainage and storm water maintenance, inlet and catch basin repair, and pavement markings. The Engineering Department is also responsible for the maintenance of the 70+ signalized intersections in the corporate limits of Belleville.

The City of Belleville pays a monthly fee for all Ameren streetlights whether they are functioning or not. Please use the Report a Concern form on the home page of the city website to report streetlight outages. Be sure to indicate the address of the streetlight.

ARBOR DAY

Belleville was named a 2014 Tree City USA by the Arbor Day Foundation in honor of its commitment to effective urban forest management. The City will be celebrating Arbor Day this year on April 24, with a tree planting at 2pm in Hough Park with the 4th grade class from Franklin School. Each class member will receive a small sapling to plant and maintain at

FRIENDS OF MOUNT HOPE CEMETERY

Friends of Mount Hope Cemetery originated on October 14, 2014, from a meeting of about a dozen people including, Belleville community leaders, the attorney from the State Comptroller's Office who is currently overseeing the Cemetery, members of the St. Clair County Genealogical and Historical Societies, and a number of other citizens from neighboring communities as well as from far-off states. These people all share the same concern: the future of Mount Hope Cemetery. The group has continued to grow throughout the year with membership now approaching 25. Their goal is to work with the state and local governments to find lasting solutions for the many challenges facing the

future of this Cemetery.

Mt. Hope is not a City-owned cemetery. Located at 9401 W. Main St. in Belleville, it has been in court-appointed receivership since August of 2009 due to neglect and abandonment by its owners. The City administration has committed to continue to help maintain the cemetery so it does not become an eyesore and have a negative effect on surrounding property values. PARKS DEPARTMENT RECEIVES COMMITMENT TO COMMUNITY AWARD

The Greater Belleville Chamber's Ambassador Club's Commitment to Community Award is presented quarterly to a member who demonstrates commitment to improving the quality of life for residents and/or businesses in the greater Belleville area. This quarter's award was presented to the Belleville Parks & Recreation Department on Thursday, March 5, 2015.

Celebrating its 70th anniversary of providing community service on April 3rd, the Parks & Recreation Department is responsible for maintaining all parklands within the city limits of Belleville; an area covering approximately 16 square miles with 18 parks and 250+

acres of parkland. The park system offers a wide variety of amenities including baseball/softball fields, tennis courts, biking/walking trails, a dog park, a skateboard park, ponds, playgrounds and pavilions, and the Nichols Community Center.

The Parks & Recreation staff is committed to continuing the cooperative working relationships established in the community, and takes pride in their work to enhance and improve the quality of life for the people in the Belleville area. As their motto proudly states, "We do the work, so you can play".

10TH ANNUAL TOUR DE BELLEVILLE BIKE RIDE

Hosted by the City's Parks and Recreation Department, this year's Tour de Belleville will be held on July 10, 2015 with a "Belleville Hillbillies" theme. This year's theme will honor Buddy Ebsen, a native of Belleville, who played the part of the millionaire hillbilly, Jed Clampett.

Pre-ride festivities will begin with live music by "Straight 6 Band" from 6:15-8:15 PM, the "Hillbillies" cast of Jed, Granny, Elly May, Jethro, Jane Hathaway, and Mr. Drysdale, and a costume contest at 8:15 PM when participants can win special prizes. The ride begins at 8:30 PM on the parking lot of Union United Methodist Church, 721 E. Main Street, Belleville. Participants can choose to ride a 5 or 15 mile route.

The cost, which includes a shirt and water bottle

Proceeds from last year's event with 2,323 participants, will allow for the purchase and installation of three trail map kiosks along our bike trails. At a cost of over \$10,000, these informative trail kiosks will indicate trail locations with mile markers, restroom facilities, drinking fountains, and shade shelters. Over the past nine years, proceeds totaling \$144,558.90 from Tour de Belleville events have paid for increased safety, maintenance equipment, and amenities for our trails.




