The September 11 Memorial Walkway of Southern Illinois is a memorial to the nearly 3,000 innocent victims who died in the vicious attacks by terrorists on September 11, 2001, often referred to as 9/11. It also honors those who came to aid and rescue, and those who survived. It symbolizes the love and compassion shown during the aftermath.

The Memorial provides a solemn place for visitors to recall the events of the day that marked the largest loss of life from a foreign attack on American soil and changed our lives forever. ■

## Moment of Remembrance


On September 11, 2011, the 10th Anniversary of 9/11, the City of Belleville and the September 11 Memorial Walkway of Southern Illinois Committee participated in a Stop & Remember Ceremony. The ceremony provided an opportunity for our community to join together with others across the nation in response to the United States Senate unanimously passing a resolution calling on all Americans to join together on 9/11/11 for a Moment of Remembrance.

Each year since then, a Moment of Remembrance Ceremony is held on September 11 at the Memorial site at 1125 S. Illinois St. ■

## Memorial Location

The September 11 Memorial Walkway of Southern Illinois is located on the front lawn of Belleville's Engine House #4, at 1125 S. Illinois Street.

This site at the intersection of IL State Routes 159 and 15 was chosen because of its high visibility and easy access.

**Hours:** Open daily, dawn until dusk

**Admission:** Free admission

**Accessibility:** Wheelchair accessible

**Parking:** Free parking is available on the lot at the west end of the building. Bus groups are welcome.

## Memorial Features

**The Brick Paved Gathering Area** is the entrance to the Memorial and the only location on site where donors are identified. The brick and granite pavers identify donors of \$125, \$225, and \$500. The bronze donor plaque identifies donors of \$1,000 and above.

**The Walkway with a Timeline** extends from the Memorial entrance to the artifact. Along the walkway, bump-outs display bronze plaques that help to tell the story of the events of 9/11 that took place in New York, at the Pentagon, in Pennsylvania, and aboard four hijacked planes. The historic timeline was created to serve as an educational resource for generations to come.

**The Survivor Tree Seedling** is a seedling produced from the fruit harvested from a Callery pear tree found during the rescue and recovery process at the World Trade Center after 9/11/2001. The tree was rescued, nurtured back to health, and then returned to its original location where it now stands on the plaza at the 9/11 Memorial in New York. Known as the Survivor Tree, it has become a symbol of America's optimism and unbreakable spirit.

**The Tribute to the Heroes of Flight 93** was intentionally constructed off the main walkway to assimilate the Flight 93 crash site in a field near Shanksville, PA, where the site is marked by a large stone in a field of wildflowers.

**The World Trade Center Artifact** is a 7,106.9 pound, 35.25 foot long steel column from the fallen World Trade Center in New York. The two concrete structures supporting the artifact are representative of the fallen north and south Twin Towers at the World Trade Center. It is undetermined as to which tower the artifact came from.

**The Artifact Plaza** is a scale representation of the inner and outer rings of the Pentagon in Arlington, VA. The ten benches surrounding the outer edge of the plaza help to emphasize its shape and provide seating for visitors to rest and reflect upon the events of September 11, 2001. ■
